I am writing to object to the approval of the DA for 351 Barrenjoey Road Newport. This DA has been approved by the planners at Northern Beaches Council in spite of the thousands of Newport residents who have objected to it.

Robertson Road is a rather unique street in Newport. Newport is split in two by the very busy Barrenjoey Road. Dining at restaurants along the main road is not much fun, as it has to be indoors. Robertson Road runs perpendicular to Barrenjoey Road, with a very dangerous pedestrian crossing at the intersection.
