Small, locally-owned cafés and restaurants add vibrancy to the area, supporting the local economy and fostering a sense of community. Encouraging local enterprises rather than large corporations will help maintain the distinct identity of Balgowlah and benefit the broader community.

For these reasons, I strongly oppose DA2025/0132 and urge the Council to reject this application in favour of more community-focused developments.
