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1. INTRODUCTION

Urbis Pty Ltd (Urbis) was engaged by APP and Waypoint on behalf of the Manly Warringah Sea Eagles (MSWE) to conduct community consultation, working collaboratively with Waypoint to undertake stakeholder engagement and communications for the redevelopment of the northern end of Brookvale Oval. The proposal is for a 3,000-seat covered grandstand, to replace existing informal spectator standing space, and the Manly Warringah Sea Eagles Centre of Excellence.

The site is located at Brookvale Oval, Pittwater Road, Brookvale NSW, within the Northern Beaches Council Local Government Area (LGA).

This outcomes report documents the community consultation, engagement and communications process, feedback received and considerations in response to feedback, during September and October 2019.

2. OVERVIEW OF PROPOSAL

Brookvale Oval has a long legacy in sport, a formal football match was held as early as 1911. The facility has been home to the Manly Warringah Sea Eagles since 1947. Recently, the facilities have struggled to keep pace with demand and no longer meet the needs of the Club and the Northern Beaches community.

The proposal is for a 3,000-seat covered grandstand to replace existing informal spectator standing space, and for a Centre of Excellence. The Centre of Excellence will be a state-of-the-art facility to be used by professional sportsmen and women in conjunction with the community. Once completed, the proposal will:

- Consolidate the Manly Warringah Sea Eagles (MWSE) training and administration bases at one location
- Provide improved training facilities for all players (from community to elite levels) to develop their skills as well as for professional players to have access to high performance training facilities
- Provide spectators with additional covered seating that delivers the highest quality viewing and entertainment experience possible at MWSE home games
- Support the operations of the MWSE and ensure its viability into the future. The proposal represents
 a significant investment into rugby league in the region.

The proposal is being jointly funded by the Federal Government, New South Wales State Government, and the MWSE.

The proposed Centre of Excellence will have a footprint of approximately 1,800sqm, and span over two levels. A cantilevered roof will extend over the seating.

3. ENGAGEMENT PROCESS

3.1. PURPOSE OF ENGAGEMENT

The proposed redevelopment of Brookvale Oval is long awaited. Local residents and community members have been involved in consultation for Brookvale Oval and Brookvale Park in various iterations over the last decade. In planning for this proposal, MWSE committed to proactively engage with the community and provide clear, factual and timely information about the proposal prior to submission of the development application (DA).

Early, open and transparent communication paves the way for a shared sense of trust and ownership between stakeholders. The stakeholder and community engagement process for the Centre of Excellence and Northern Grandstand outlined in this report sought to:

- Provide accurate information about the Concept Plans.
- Deliver an independent, transparent and accountable consultation process and provide a range of ways for people to engage and give feedback.
- Create pathways for stakeholder interaction and feedback that are open and transparent.
- Document key feedback to inform ongoing design and planning.
- Collate feedback to inform the proposal.

3.2. OVERVIEW OF ENGAGEMENT ACTIVITIES

Community engagement activities were undertaken in September – October 2019. These are outlined below, and feedback is detailed in Section 4 of this report:

- Near neighbour newsletter:
 - A newsletter was prepared to outline key features of the proposal, answers questions regarding the proposal and gain feedback from the community.
- Newsletter distribution:
 - On Tuesday 24 September 2019, the near neighbour newsletter was distributed to 450 commercial and residential properties in the local area.
- Door knock:
 - On Wednesday 25 September 2019, Urbis Engagement conducted a door knock visiting 52 residential and commercial properties to provide information about the proposal, answer questions and advise of the Community Information Session.
- Community Information session:
 - On Wednesday 16 October 2019, a Community Information Session was held at Brookvale Oval to provide local residents and near neighbours information about the proposal and an opportunity to ask questions of the project team.
- Dedicated website for information sharing.
- Dedicated feedback channels included a project email and phone number.

3.2.1. Near neighbour newsletter

A newsletter was prepared to outline key features of the Centre of Excellence and Northern Grandstand, artist's impressions, construction information, planning pathway and to invite members of the community to contribute their ideas and thoughts. The newsletter also advertised details of the Community Information Session.

A copy of the newsletter can be found in Appendix A.

A detailed summary of feedback has been outlined in Section 4 of this report.

3.2.2. Near neighbour letterbox drop

Urbis Engagement identified near neighbour and bordering properties to deliver a newsletter straight to their letterbox explaining the proposal and how to utilise the dedicated feedback channels. This was an opportunity to provide information, answer questions and collect feedback.

3.2.3. Door knock

On 25 September 2019, Urbis Engagement conducted a door knock of neighbouring residents to supply information about the Centre of Excellence and Northern Grandstand and inform residents of the opportunities to provide feedback. The streets visited include:

- Pittwater Road, Brookvale
- Pine Avenue, Brookvale
- Federal Parade, Brookvale
- Binba Place, Brookvale and,
- Alfred Rd, Brookvale.

Twenty-six residents were home at the time of the door knock and provided feedback.

Those residents who were not home were provided with a "sorry we missed you" note which included details of the upcoming Community Information Session and feedback channels for further information.

Overall, residents who were door knocked were positive/neutral about the proposal.

The door knock catchment is shown below.

3.2.4. Website

As part of the consultation process, and to ensure access to detailed information regarding the proposal, a dedicated project information website was developed and published.

The project website provided information about the proposed development application, the planning process, contact information and frequently asked questions.

This engagement activity was designed to be used as an inform tool, with easily accessible information available anywhere, at any time. The website received 7,038 page views with 6,667 unique page views and visitors spent an average time of five minutes and five seconds on the page.

3.2.8. Community Information Session

A two-hour information session was held on Wednesday 16 October 2019 at the Heritage Room, Brookvale Oval, Brookvale. Approximately 20 people attended the session. Feedback collected at the information sessions has been collated into Section 4 of this report. At the information session, feedback was received via:

- Direct discussions with members of the project team who were briefed to note key issues and questions
 raised during discussions. These were collated and reviewed at the end of the Information session. All
 feedback was scribed by an Urbis staff member at the sessions.
- Feedback forms six were received.

3.2.9. Engagement email and phone line

Members of the public were invited to contact Urbis Engagement through a dedicated 1800 phone number and/or an email address for the duration of the engagement period. A total of five people phoned or emailed to provide feedback or seek further information during the period of September – October 2019.

3.3. FUTURE ENGAGEMENT ACTIVITIES

At the time of writing this report, community and stakeholder engagement activities are ongoing.

The following activities are scheduled:

- Meetings with key project stakeholders as future project milestones are achieved.

4. ENGAGEMENT FEEDBACK

4.1. KEY THEMES

Key themes which emerged from the feedback included the following:

Overall comments

- Positive feedback regarding the investment in the upgrading Brookvale Oval and the economic benefit to the Northern Beaches region.
- Support for long overdue progress of the redevelopment of Brookvale Oval/Park

Traffic and parking

- Significant community feedback pertaining to the current traffic and parking challenges experienced on Pine Avenue, Federal Parade, Binba Place and Alfred Road.
- Residents expressed concern about the anticipated impact of the proposal on existing traffic and parking conditions. Positive feedback regarding the proposed location of the on-grade parking located off Alfred Road (as to not contribute to traffic on Federal Parade and Pine Avenue).

Maintaining community use and access

 Positive feedback was received regarding the continued community use and access to the Park for leisure and recreation.

Relationship between Brookvale Oval and Park

- Positive feedback was received regarding the architectural design of the proposed Northern façade of Centre of Excellence and Brookvale Park, and that this will "activate" this area and contribute to a safer environment with ambient light permeating through the façade.
- Feedback was received regarding ways to maintain the relationship between the proposal and existing walking tracks around Brookvale Oval and Park, including level access around the interior walking route and connecting the proposal area and to the adjoining park.
- Enquiries were received regarding the pedestrian and vehicular movements to and from the Centre of Excellence and Brookvale Park.
- Feedback received that the proposal should not impact the "Village Green" area, or children's playground in Brookvale Park.

4.2. DETAILED FEEDBACK AND RESPONSES

Key themes which emerged during the engagement process undertaken by Urbis Engagement are outlined below.

Next steps

In October 2019, the Manly Warringah Sea Eagles will submit the proposal to the Northern Beaches Council. As Council is the landowner, and the cost of works are over \$5M, the Development Application will be considered Regionally Significant Development.

Assessment of the application will therefore be undertaken by an independent planning consultant on behalf of Council.

The application will then be placed on public exhibition for view and comment.

Following public exhibition, a review and determination will be made by the Sydney North Planning Panel, which compromises representatives appointed by the State Government and by Northern Beaches Council.

It is anticipated these plans will be on public exhibition in November 2019 and a decision made by late 2019 or early 2020. Pending planning approval, the first stage of construction is likely to commence in mid 2020. Construction is anticipated to take 12 - 18 months. Construction will be guided by a Construction Management Plan that will also require Council approval. During the construction work, every effort will be made to minimise disruption to local traffic and on-street parking. Regular updates will be provided to near neighbours during the construction period.

Brookvale Oval has a long legacy in sport, a formal football match was held as early as 1911. The facility has been home to the Manly Warringah Sea Eagles since 1947 and has produced longheld community memories for over 70 years. Recently, the facilities have struggled to keep pace with demand and no longer meet the needs of the Club and the Northern Beaches community.

After 15 years of ongoing negotiations, the much needed facilities are now fully funded by the NSW Government, Federal Government and the Manly Warringah Seal Eagles Club, ensuring ratepayers are not required to contribute to the development.

The proposed Centre of Excellence and northern grandstand will secure the future of the Sea Eagles at their historic home at Brookvale Park and is a testament to the strong relationship between the Club and Northern Beaches Council.

In recent weeks traces of asbestos were identified below ground during soil testing. Northern Beaches Council has engaged an independent consultant to develop a management plan to eliminate the risk and to ensure public health and safety. Artificial turf has been installed on the affected areas and an assessment has found that the risk of asbestos exposure to park users, spectators and the community has been effectively eliminated.



The management plan will be updated to include the necessary strategies required to manage public health and safety during the construction phase.

As a near neighbour, Manly Warringah Sea Eagles is committed to keeping you informed.

A Heritage Impact Statement has been completed assessing the heritage significance of Brookvale Oval.

Heritage landscape item of local significance was identified:

Brush Box and Camphor Laurel trees surrounding Brookvale Park, Pine Avenue, Alfred Street, unmade section of Federal Parade and Pittwater Road (near Pine Street intersection) The tree line has been previously disrupted to make way for development.

Some trees will need to be removed to allow for the construction of the Centre of Excellence and Northern Grandstand.

The Project Team and MWSE are committed to compensatory tree planting with advanced mature trees.

A ground level carpark as indicated below will be used by the Centre of Excellence. This will be accessed via the existing Alfred Street driveway. This carpark will provide approximately an additional 10 spaces to the existing 50 spaces on site.

Traffic and parking

A traffic impact analysis has been conducted for this proposal.

Game Day

The proposed grandstand will replace the existing seating and standing arrangement resulting in no increase in spectator capacity.

Loading and service vehicles will access the oval from Alfred Street, as it is currently. Timing of these service vehicle movements will be outside of school peak pick up and drop off times.



Non-game day

It has been calculated that the proposal will create an increase of 22 vehicles in the morning peak and 20 vehicles in the afternoon peak.

As this is a relatively minor increase in vehicles, it is anticipated that the proposal will have limited impact.

Giving Back to Brookvale

The Centre for Excellence will support Club development both on and off the field and bolster its ambition of launching a women's NRL team and further enhancing youth sporting development.

Brookvale Park will continue to be open for public access, both during and post construction.

The Centre of Excellence will be the hub for all Club community engagement initiatives, allowing the club to build on the success with programs such as 'Read with the Eagles' and 'Sea Eagles Breakfast Club'. The Manly Warringah Sea Eagles is committed to improved education and literacy outcomes, raising awareness of healthy lifestyles, fostering self-esteem, positive behavior and mental health amongst young people.

Managing Construction

Construction

Pending planning approval, the first stage of construction likely to commence in mid-2020. Construction is anticipated to take 12-18 months.

A construction management plan will be developed to mitigate impacts on near neighbours, that will also require Council approval.

The project team are aware of the current challenges facing traffic and parking in the local area and will ensure the construction management plan takes this into consideration for deliveries and worker vehicles.

Traffic

We understand the community is concerned about congestion in local streets during school drop off and pick up time. Truck movements and delivery will where possible be minimised during these times.

Dust

As the excavation of large basement area is not proposed, it is expected that there will be limited activity creating dust on site.

Best practice measures will be taken to suppress dust during construction, this includes barriers and screens to contain dust, maintaining clean work site and water sprays to supress dust particles.

Asbestos

Northern Beaches Council has proactively engaged an independent consultant to develop an Asbestos Management Plan that outlines the necessary strategies required to eliminate the potential risk to public health and safety on site.

Major deliveries may need to be via Pine Avenue to mitigate any impact on the tree canopy. However this will be reviewed with the builder once they have been appointed.

Parking

We understanding parking is limited in surrounding streets. To mitigate any impacts on street parking availability, construction workers will be provided off street designated parking area and will be encouraged to park in this area.

Noise and vibrations

During construction particular care will be taken to restrict and minimise vibration which could be generated during the progress of the works. The type of work requires is not anticipated to generate substantial noise, however this will be reviewed in detail by the builder as part of their construction management plan.

Work practices to minimise noise impacts will be compliance with EPA construction noise guidelines, and any other conditions stipulated by Council. Using the recommendations of the Asbestos Management Plan, Northern Beaches Council has installed artificial turf on the affected areas. The subsequent assessment of these areas has determined that the risk of asbestos exposure to park users, spectators and the community has been effectively eliminated.

The project team will develop a second Asbestos Management Plan, which will outline the necessary strategies required to manage public health and safety during the construction phase.

Communication with neighbours

Regular updates will be provided to near neighbours during the construction period. Signage will be posted on site with project team contact details.
