ASSESSMENT INTRODUCTION

SITE DESCRIPTION

Lot 1 DP 187342 , 36 Carrington Parade CURL CURL NSW 2096
The subject site consists of one (1) allotment located on the south-western side of Carrington Parade.
The site is irregular in shape with a curved frontage of 38m along Carrington Parade and a depth of 22m. The site also has a street frontage to Beach Street of 31m. The site has a surveyed area of 383.5m ² .
The site is located within the R2 Low Density Residential zone and accommodates a two storey dwelling house with attached double garage.
The site has a moderate slope from the south-western corner down to the north-eastern frontage (Carrington Parade).
The site does not consist of any significant vegetation or trees.
Detailed Description of Adjoining/Surrounding Development



Adjoining and surrounding development is characterised by detached double storey dwellings and residential apartments. Directly to the west of the site is a three storey dwelling currently under construction. To the south of the site are residential apartment buildings (across Beach Street). Across the road the north is South Curl Curl Beach and South Curl Curl Ocean pool. A public car park is across the road.



SITE HISTORY

The land has been used for residential purposes for an extended period of time. A search of Council's records has revealed the following relevant history:

- DA2017/0112 Construction of a new dwelling was withdrawn on 28 March 2017.
- PLM2020/0083 For alterations and additions to a dwelling house was held on 5 June 2020.

<u>Comment:</u> The applicant has amended the plans to align the top level balcony and privacy screen with the ground floor, resulting in the most north-western corner being setback 6.5m. The amended plans address the submission issue.

All, Environmental Planning Instruments (SEPPs, REPs and LEPs), Development Controls Plans and Council Policies have been considered in the merit assessment of this application.

In this regard, whilst all provisions of each Environmental Planning Instruments (SEPPs, REPs and LEPs), Development Controls Plans and Council Policies have been considered in the assessment, many provisions contained within the document are not relevant or are enacting, definitions and operational provisions which the proposal is considered to be acceptable against.

As such, an assessment is provided against the controls relevant to the merit consideration of the application hereunder.

State Environmental Planning Policies (SEPPs) and State Regional Environmental Plans (SREPs)

SEPP 55 - Remediation of Land

Clause 7 (1) (a) of SEPP 55 requires the Consent Authority to consider whether land is contaminated. Council records indicate that the subject site has been used for residential purposes for a significant period of time with no prior land uses. In this regard it is considered that the site poses no risk of contamination and therefore, no further consideration is required under Clause 7 (1) (b) and (c) of SEPP 55 and the land is considered to be suitable for the residential land use.

SEPP (Building Sustainability Index: BASIX) 2004

A BASIX certificate has been submitted with the application (see Certificate No. A369747 dated 26 May 2020).



A condition has been included in the recommendation of this report requiring compliance with the commitments indicated in the BASIX Certificate.

SEPP (Infrastructure) 2007

<u>Ausgrid</u>

Clause 45 of the SEPP requires the Consent Authority to consider any development application (or an application for modification of consent) for any development carried out:

- within or immediately adjacent to an easement for electricity purposes (whether or not the electricity infrastructure exists).
- immediately adjacent to an electricity substation.
- within 5.0m of an overhead power line.
- includes installation of a swimming pool any part of which is: within 30m of a structure supporting an overhead electricity transmission line and/or within 5.0m of an overhead electricity power line.

Comment:

The proposal was referred to Ausgrid. No response has been received within the 21 day statutory period and therefore, it is assumed that no objections are raised and no conditions are recommended.

SEPP (Coastal Management) 2018

The site is subject to SEPP Coastal Management (2018). Accordingly, an assessment under the SEPP has been carried out as follows:

10 Development on certain land within coastal wetlands and littoral rainforests area

- (1) The following may be carried out on land identified as "coastal wetlands" or "littoral rainforest" on the Coastal Wetlands and Littoral Rainforests Area Map only with development consent:
 - (a) the clearing of native vegetation within the meaning of Part 5A of the Local Land Services Act 2013,
 - (b) the harm of marine vegetation within the meaning of Division 4 of Part 7 of the Fisheries Management Act 1994,

 - (i) earthworks (including the depositing of material on land),
 - (ii) constructing a levee,
 - (iii) draining the land,
 - (iv) environmental protection works,
 - (d) any other development.

Comment:

Not within littoral rain forest or coastal wetlands area.

11 Development on land in proximity to coastal wetlands or littoral rainforest

(1) Development consent must not be granted to development on land identified as "proximity



area for coastal wetlands" or "proximity area for littoral rainforest" on the Coastal Wetlands and Littoral Rainforests Area Map unless the consent authority is satisfied that the proposed development will not significantly impact on:

- (a) the biophysical, hydrological or ecological integrity of the adjacent coastal wetland or littoral rainforest, or
- (b) the quantity and quality of surface and ground water flows to and from the adjacent coastal wetland or littoral rainforest.

Comment:

Not within littoral rain forest or coastal wetlands proximity area.

12 Development on land within the coastal vulnerability area

Development consent must not be granted to development on land that is within the area identified as "coastal vulnerability area" on the Coastal Vulnerability Area Map unless the consent authority is satisfied that:

- (a) if the proposed development comprises the erection of a building or works—the building or works are engineered to withstand current and projected coastal hazards for the design life of the building or works, and
- (b) the proposed development:
 - *(i) is not likely to alter coastal processes to the detriment of the natural environment or other land, and*
 - (ii) is not likely to reduce the public amenity, access to and use of any beach, foreshore, rock platform or headland adjacent to the proposed development, and
 - (iii) incorporates appropriate measures to manage risk to life and public safety from coastal hazards, and
- (c) measures

are in place to ensure that there are appropriate responses to, and management of. anticipated coastal processes and current and future coastal hazards.

Comment:

Not within coastal vulnerability area.



13 Development on land within the coastal environment area

- (1) Development consent must not be granted to development on land that is within the coastal environment area unless the consent authority has considered whether the proposed development is likely to cause an adverse impact on the following:
 - (a) the integrity and resilience of the biophysical, hydrological (surface and groundwater) and ecological environment,
 - (b) coastal environmental values and natural coastal processes,
 - (c) the water quality of the marine estate (within the meaning of the Marine Estate Management Act 2014), in particular, the cumulative impacts of the proposed development on any of the sensitive coastal lakes identified in Schedule 1,
 - (d) marine vegetation, native vegetation and fauna and their habitats, undeveloped headlands and rock platforms,
 - (e) existing public open space and safe access to and along the foreshore, beach, headland or rock platform for members of the public, including persons with a disability,

Comment:

The application has been referred to Council's coast and catchment who have reviewed the proposal with regard to impact upon the matters listed (a)-(g). The proposal is not considered to have an unreasonable impact to the above matters and complies with the requirements.

- (2) Development consent must not be granted to development on land to which this clause applies unless the consent authority is satisfied that:
 - (a) the development is designed, sited and will be managed to avoid an adverse impact referred to in subclause (1), or
 - (b) if that impact cannot be reasonably avoided—the development is designed, sited and will be managed to minimise that impact, or
 - (c) if that impact cannot be minimised—the development will be managed to mitigate that impact.

Comment:

The proposal has been sited to avoid impacts.

14 Development on land within the coastal use area

(1)

(a) has considered whether the proposed development is likely to cause an adverse impact on the following:

(i) existing, safe access to and along the foreshore, beach, headland or rock platform for members of the public, including persons with a disability,

(ii) overshadowing, wind funnelling and the loss of views from public places to foreshores,

- (iii) the visual amenity and scenic qualities of the coast, including coastal headlands,
- (iv) Aboriginal cultural heritage, practices and places,
- (v) cultural and built environment heritage, and

(c) has taken into account the surrounding coastal and built environment, and the bulk, scale and size of the proposed development.

Comment:

The proposed development does not impact upon public access to the foreshore, unreasonable visual amenity impacts or impacts upon cultural heritage.

As such, it is considered that the application complies with the requirements of the State Environmental Planning Policy (Coastal Management) 2018.

15 Development in coastal zone generally—development not to increase risk of coastal hazards

Development consent must not be granted to development on land within the coastal zone unless the consent authority is satisfied that the proposed development is not likely to cause increased risk of coastal hazards on that land or other land.

The proposal does not result in an increase to coastal hazards.

<u>Comment</u>: The applicant has submitted a Geotechnical Assessment Report prepared by a suitably qualified geotechnical expert. This report concludes that the proposed development is acceptable from a geotechnical perspective and therefore, Council is satisfied that the development has been assessed for the risk associated with landslides in relation to both property and life.

(b) the development will not cause significant detrimental impacts because of stormwater discharge from the development site, and

<u>Comment</u>: The applicant has submitted a Geotechnical Assessment Report prepared by a suitably qualified geotechnical expert. Detailed Assessment

B7 Front Boundary Setbacks

Description of non-compliance

The subject site is an irregular shaped lot which has a large curved street frontage presenting to Carrington Parade. The existing dwelling has a varied front setback between 3.4m and 10.8m. Any opportunity for an addition to the existing dwelling is limited to the front setback area fronting



Carrington Parade and strict compliance with the front setback would severely inhibit development of the site.

The proposed addition is situated on the north-eastern corner and aligns with the existing western side boundary setback. The proposed location of the new addition is considered the most feasible opportunity for site development given the constrained nature of the site and position of the existing dwelling. It is noted that more 50% of the new proposed works sit behind the required 6.5m building setback and a large portion of the works sitting within the front setback upon the first floor consist of an open balcony.

Therefore, given the site constraints it is appropriate to undertake a merit assessment of the propose front setback variation.

Merit consideration:

With regard to the consideration for a variation, the development is considered against the underlying Objectives of the Control as follows:

• To create a sense of openness.

Comment:

The proposed development complies with the require 40% landscaped open space requirement for the site. It is noted that all of the required landsacped area is provided along the Carrington Parade Road Frontage within the front setback area. A portion of the non-compliance is an open balcony which assists in creating an open feel and provides additional building articulation.

• To maintain the visual continuity and pattern of buildings and landscape elements.

Comment:

As viewed from the south-east and north-west of the site (looking along Carrington Parade) the built form generally aligns with the new development upon 37 Carrington Parade and will not protrude further north of the building on 37 Carrington Parade. The site does not have any other immediately adjoining neighbours which need to be considered with regards to the visual pattern of buildings. The front setback area is consistent with the landscaped character of Carrington Parade and provide landscape open space within the front setback area, consistent with the surrounds.

• To protect and enhance the visual quality of streetscapes and public spaces.

Comment:

As described above, the most northern extent of the proposed development aligns with the building of 37 Carrington Parade and is not considered to result in an detrimental impact of the visual quality of the streetscape. The proposed development provides open balconies and a stepped facade to create visual interest. Significant portions of the front setback area remain landscaped.

The building can be seen from the public car park across the road, from Curl Curl Beach and from the waterway. Council's assessment officer has undertaken site inspections and



considered the visual impact of the development as viewed from the various surrounding public spaces. It is considered the position of the addition to be the most reasonable solution for the site development notwithstanding the numerical non-compliance and that the development will not have an adverse impact on the visual quality of the street or as viewed form public spaces. At present the facade is quite bare and the open balcony will provide some additional visual interest and improve amenity for the residents.

• To achieve reasonable view sharing.

Comment:

The proposal is consistent with the planning principle established by *Tenacity Consulting v Warringah Council (2004) NSWLEC 140.* This is discussed in detail later within this assessment report and the non-compliant element of the building will not result in an unreasonable view impact.

Having regard to the above assessment, it is concluded that the proposed development is consistent with the relevant objectives of WDCP and the objectives specified in s1.3 of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act, 1979. Accordingly, this assessment finds that the proposal is supported, in this particular circumstance.

D7 Views

The application was notified for 14 days and no submissions were received which raised concern regarding view impacts as a result of the proposed development.

Notwithstanding this, the impact of the development upon views from the surrounding properties has been considered as part of the assessment and Council's assessment officer undertook site inspections from around the property and site vicinity.

The elevated residential units to the south of the site have been considered with regards to views. It is noted that there will be a minor impact to the view of south curl curl ocean pool as a result of the proposed development. This was determined by undertaking a view impact assessment by standing at South Curl Curl Pool. See image below.





It was noted that a detailed assessment was undertaken for the development application on 37 Curl Curl Parade (DA2019/0519) which included a photograph from the Residential Unit to the south of the site. This photograph is replicated below:





View looking north over the subject site from 35/2 Beach Street

The proposed development will result in a partial view obstruction to South Curl Curl pool from this residential unit to the South. However, extensive 180 degree views of the Pacific Ocean and Curl Curl Beach will be retained from this unit and the proposed development will not have an unreasonable view obstruction. The proposal is considered to be consistent with the view sharing principles established in the Land and Environment Court Case of Tenacity Consulting Pty Ltd Vs Warringah Council (2004) NSWLEC 140. In this regard, the proposal does not result in unreasonable view impacts and is supported.

THREATENED SPECIES, POPULATIONS OR ECOLOGICAL COMMUNITIES

The proposal will not significantly affect threatened species, populations or ecological communities, or their habitats.

CRIME PREVENTION THROUGH ENVIRONMENTAL DESIGN

The proposal is consistent with the principles of Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design.

Northern Beaches Section 7.12 Contributions Plan 2019

The proposal is subject to the application of Northern Beaches Section 7.12 Contributions Plan 2019.

A monetary contribution of \$2,955 is required for the provision of new and augmented public infrastructure. The contribution is calculated as 1% of the total development cost of \$295,460.

In the event of any inconsistency between conditions of this consent and the drawings/documents referred to above, the conditions of this consent will prevail.

Reason: To ensure the work is carried out in accordance with the determination of Council and approved plans.

2. **Prescribed Conditions**

- (a) All building works must be carried out in accordance with the requirements of the Building Code of Australia (BCA).
- (b) BASIX affected development must comply with the schedule of BASIX commitments specified within the submitted BASIX Certificate (demonstrated compliance upon plans/specifications is required prior to the issue of the Construction Certificate);
- (c) A sign must be erected in a prominent position on any site on which building work, subdivision work or demolition work is being carried out:
 - (i) showing the name, address and telephone number of the Principal Certifying Authority for the work, and



- (ii) showing the name of the principal contractor (if any) for any building work and a telephone number on which that person may be contacted outside working hours, and
- (iii) stating that unauthorised entry to the work site is prohibited.

Any such sign is to be maintained while the building work, subdivision work or demolition work is being carried out, but must be removed when the work has been completed.

Demolition and excavation works are restricted to:

• 8.00 am to 5.00 pm Monday to Friday only.

(Excavation work includes the use of any excavation machinery and the use of jackhammers, rock breakers, excavators, loaders and the like, regardless of whether the activities disturb or alter the natural state of the existing ground stratum or are breaking up/removing materials from the site).

- (b) Should any asbestos be uncovered on site, its demolition and removal must be carried out in accordance with WorkCover requirements and the relevant Australian Standards.
- (c) At all times after the submission the Notice of Commencement to Council, a copy of the Development Consent and Construction Certificate is to remain onsite at all times until the issue of a final Occupation Certificate. The consent shall be available for perusal of any Authorised Officer.
- (d) Where demolition works have been completed and new construction works have not commenced within 4 weeks of the completion of the demolition works that area affected by the demolition works shall be fully stabilised and the site must be maintained in a safe and clean state until such time as new construction works commence.
- (e) Onsite toilet facilities (being either connected to the sewer or an accredited sewer management facility) for workers are to be provided for construction sites at a rate of 1 per 20 persons.
- (f) Prior to the release of the Construction Certificate, payment of the Long Service Levy is required. This payment can be made at Council or to the Long Services Payments Corporation. Upon completion of the development, such temporary structures or appliances are to be removed within 7 days.

4. Policy Controls

Northern Beaches 7.12 Contributions Plan 2019

A monetary contribution of \$2,954.60 is payable to Northern Beaches Council for the provision



of local infrastructure and services pursuant to section 7.12 of the Environmental Planning & Assessment Act 1979 and the Northern Beaches Section 7.12 Contributions Plan 2019. The monetary contribution is based on a development cost of \$295,460.00.

The monetary contribution is to be paid prior to the issue of the first Construction Certificate or Subdivision Certificate whichever occurs first, or prior to the issue of the Subdivision Certificate where no Construction Certificate is required. If the monetary contribution (total or in part) remains unpaid after the financial quarter that the development consent is issued, the amount unpaid (whether it be the full cash contribution or part thereof) will be adjusted on a quarterly basis in accordance with the applicable Consumer Price Index. If this situation applies, the cash contribution payable for this development will be the total unpaid monetary contribution as adjusted.

The proponent shall provide to the Certifying Authority written evidence (receipt/s) from Council that the total monetary contribution has been paid.

5. Security Bond

A bond (determined from cost of works) of \$1,500 and an inspection fee in accordance with Council's Fees and Charges paid as security are required to ensure the rectification of any damage that may occur to the Council infrastructure contained within the road reserve adjoining the site as a result of construction or the transportation of materials and equipment to and from the development site.

An inspection fee in accordance with Council adopted fees and charges (at the time of payment) is payable for each kerb inspection as determined by Council (minimum (1) one inspection).

All bonds and fees shall be deposited with Council prior to Construction Certificate or demolition work commencing, and details demonstrating payment are to be submitted to the Certifying Authority prior to the issue of the Construction Certificate.

6. Soil and Water Management Program

A Soil and Water Management Plan prepared in accordance with Landcom's 'Managing Urban Stormwater: Soils and Construction' (2004) and implemented on site until the works are



completed.

Details demonstrating compliance are to be submitted to the Certifying Authority prior to the issue of the Construction Certificate.

Reason: To protect the environment from the effects of sedimentation and erosion from development sites.

7. **Compliance with Standards**

The development is required to be carried out in accordance with all relevant Australian Standards.

Details demonstrating compliance with the relevant Australian Standard are to be submitted to the Certifying Authority prior to the issue of the Construction Certificate.

Reason: To ensure the development is constructed in accordance with appropriate standards.

8. External Finishes to Roof

The external finish to the roof shall have a medium to dark range in order to minimise solar reflections to neighbouring properties. Any roof with a metallic steel finish is not permitted.

Details demonstrating compliance are to be submitted to the Certifying Authority prior to the issue of the Construction Certificate.

Reason: To ensure that excessive glare or reflectivity nuisance does not occur as a result of the development.

CONDITIONS TO BE COMPLIED WITH DURING DEMOLITION AND BUILDING WORK

9. Installation and Maintenance of Sediment Control

Prior to any works commencing on site, including demolition, sediment and erosion controls must be installed in accordance with Landcom's 'Managing Urban Stormwater: Soils and Construction' (2004). Techniques used for erosion and sediment control on site are to be adequately maintained and monitored at all times, particularly after periods of rain, and shall remain in proper operation until all development activities have been completed and the site is sufficiently stabilised with vegetation.

Reason: To protect the surrounding environment from the effects of sedimentation and erosion from the site.
