### 1. Summary

This report outlines the outcomes of community and stakeholder engagement as part of the review of the Community Service Awards Policy and proposal to make one amendment, the inclusion of a new award category Community Group of the Year, that would enhance Council's recognition of outstanding community groups working to improve the Northern Beaches.

Further, feedback was sought on two proposed operational changes that will:

- improve the Operational Guidelines to allow non-Australian Citizens to win the Outstanding Community Service Awards
- amend the process for selecting the judging panel to invite the current Citizen of the Year to participate on the judging panel as one of the five community members selecting the next year's award winners if they so choose.

The feedback collected during consultation indicated a high level of support for the proposed amendment to include the Community Group of the Year category and the two operational changes. Many respondents noted the important contributions being made by community groups and non- Australian Citizens and supported the collective and more inclusive recognition for the positive impact these community members are making to the Northern Beaches.


Two submissions questioned the proposed operational change to allow non-Australian citizens to be eligible for the Outstanding Community Service Awards. One respondent's view was the awards should only be open to Australian citizens while the second respondent questioned if they would need to be a resident and what criteria would apply to assessing their contribution to the community.

One submission suggested that all award winners could be given the opportunity to nominate to be a judge in the following year as opposed to only offering this opportunity to the Citizen of the Year.

Several submissions also suggested these additional amendments to the policy and operational guidelines:

- increasing the number of judges from five to seven or nine judges,
- Council staff take responsibility for inviting award recipient's guests to the award ceremony, and
- acknowledging a runner up or highly commended to the Community Group of the Year Award category to spread the public recognition as wide as possible.



### 2. Background

The Community Services Award Policy (the Policy) provides the framework for Council to recognise the outstanding contributions of people making a difference in the community. The current policy was adopted at the Ordinary Council Meeting of 26 November 2019. The Policy required review by 30 June 2023.

In reviewing the Policy, some changes to the policy have been recommended. We are required to publicly exhibit the proposed draft policy including any amendments. Exhibition of the proposed changes is intended to provide the community with the opportunity to indicate their support or non-support of the revised policy and to provide comments. We provided a marked-up version of the current policy to make the changes easy for our community to review.

## 3. Engagement objectives

Community and stakeholder engagement aimed to:

- build community and stakeholder awareness of participation activities
- provide accessible information so community and stakeholders can participate in a meaningful way

- provide balanced and objective information to assist in understanding the problem, alternatives and/or solutions.
- identify community and stakeholder concerns, local knowledge and values
- seek understanding on community support for proposed amendment to policy and operational changes
- gather additional recommendations for amendments to the policy and operational changes.

### 4. Engagement approach

Community and stakeholder engagement for the Community Service Awards Policy was conducted between Monday 3 July to Monday 31 July, providing opportunities for community and stakeholders to contribute.

The engagement was planned, implemented and reported in accordance with Council's Community Engagement Strategy (2022).

A project page was established on our have your say platform with information provided in an accessible and easy to read format.

The project was primarily promoted through our regular email newsletter (EDM) channels, a media release and social channels.

Feedback was captured through an online submission form embedded onto the have your say project page. The form included a question that directly asked respondents for their level of support on the proposal - *Do you support the proposed amendments to the Policy and guidelines?* allowing us to gauge, at a high-level, the community's sentiment. A qualitative review of the submitted comments was performed to analyse the high-level sentiment in more detail and understand key themes.

An open-field comments box provided community members a space to explain or elaborate on their support, not support or neutral sentiment as well as any other feedback they wished to contribute.

Email and written comments were also invited.

#### 4.1. Reaching diverse audiences

It was determined for this project that it was particularly important to hear from previous award recipients and former judges. A direct email was sent to these stakeholders providing information about the public exhibition and encouraging them to make a submission via the have your say project page.

Other stakeholder groups including youth, people living with disability, and those interested in the environment were targeted through e-Newsletters; KALOF, The Wave Disability Newsletter, Cooee Newsletter, and The Drift Library Newsletter.

## 5. Findings

The submissions received demonstrate overwhelming support for the proposed amendments to both the policy and operational guidelines.

Several of the respondents were former award recipients or judges, and their knowledge of the nomination, judging, and award ceremony processes added valuable feedback in support of the proposed amendments.



Many submissions reflected on the important and significant contributions made by community groups, non-Australian citizens, and non-residents in making the Northern Beaches a better place for all. Broad support to recognise these people was received, with the exception of two submissions relating to inclusion of eligibility for non-Australian citizens.

Respondents raised some issues and other consideration which are addressed in Table 1.
