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# **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

Urbis has been engaged by Manly Warringah Sea Eagles (MWSE) (the Proponent) to provide an Aboriginal Objects Due Diligence Assessment (DDA) for the proposed development of a Centre of Excellence and new Grandstand at Lot 1-6 DP1141128, Lot 47 DP3674, Lot 1 DP114027, Lot 1 DP784268, Lot 6 DP785409 and Lot B DP966128, Brookvale Oval, Pittwater Road, Brookvale NSW (hereafter referred as the 'subject area').

The subject area covers approximately 5 hectares (ha) and comprises a football field, carpark, grandstand facilities, other structures, landscaped area and perimeter trees. The subject area is located to the south of Federal Parade, west of Pine Avenue, north of Pittwater Road and east of Alfred Road.

The DDA was prepared in accordance to the *Due Diligence Code of Practice for the Protection of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales* (DECCW, 2010) ('Due Diligence Code'), and included the following:

- Comprehensive background research of the AHIMS register, statutory and non-statutory heritage listings;
- Analysis of landscape features and their potential to retain Aboriginal objects;
- Analysis of historical land use and its impact on the subject area; and
- Preliminary site inspection.

The DDA concluded that:

- There are no registered Aboriginal object and/or archaeological sites located within the subject area;
- The subject area is highly disturbed; and
- Due to the level of past soil disturbance and low sensitivity for Aboriginal objects to exist it is considered unlikely that the proposed works will harm Aboriginal cultural heritage and therefore no further assessment for Aboriginal heritage is recommended.

Based on the above conclusions, the proposed development can proceed with caution in line with the following recommendations:

- 1. This DDA should be kept providing proof for the Due Diligence Process applied for the subject area;
- 2. No further archaeological works relating to Aboriginal objects and/or archaeological sites are necessary; and
- 3. In the unlikely event that suspected human remains are encountered during the demolition of the existing building, all work in the area that may cause further impact, must cease immediately and the following measures must be implemented:
  - The location, including a 20 m curtilage, should be secured using barrier fencing to avoid further harm;
  - The NSW Police must be contacted immediately;
  - Notify OEH's Environment Line on 131 555 as soon as practicable and provide available details of the remains and their location;
  - No further action is to be undertaken until the NSW Police provide written clearance for the identified remains;
  - Should the remains be identified as Aboriginal, the appropriate Local Aboriginal Land Council must be notified; and
  - A suitably qualified archaeologist and/or anthropologist with forensic training must be contacted.

# **1. INTRODUCTION**

## 1.1. LOCATION AND PURPOSE OF THIS ASSESSMENT

Urbis has been engaged by Manly Warringah Sea Eagles (MWSE) (the proponent) to provide an Aboriginal Objects Due Diligence Assessment (DDA) for the proposed development of a Centre of Excellence and new Grandstand at Lot 1-6 DP1141128, Lot 47 DP3674, Lot 1 DP114027, Lot 1 DP784268, Lot 6 DP785409 and Lot B DP966128, Brookvale Oval, Pittwater Road, Brookvale NSW (hereafter referred as the 'subject area') (Figure 1 and Figure 2). The subject area covers approximately 5 ha and comprises a football field, carpark, grandstand facilities, other structures, landscaped area and perimeter trees. The subject area is located to the south of Federal Parade, west of Pine Avenue, north of Pittwater Road and east of Alfred Road.

This DDA was prepared to investigate whether the proposed development will harm Aboriginal objects that may exist within the subject area. The assessment will follow the generic steps of the *Due Diligence Code of Practice for the Protection of Aboriginal Objects in New South Wales* (DECCW, 2010) ('Due Diligence Code'). The generic due diligence process is shown on Figure 3 below.

## 1.2. PROPOSED WORKS

The proposed works include the development of a Centre of Excellence and new grandstand facilities at Brookvale Oval. The project aims to:

- Consolidate the Manly Warringah Sea Eagles training and administration bases at one location;
- Provide improved training facilities for all players (from community to elite levels) to develop their skills as well as for professional players to have access to high performance training facilities;
- Provide spectators with additional covered seating that delivers the highest quality viewing and entertainment experience possible at Manly Warringah Sea Eagles home games; and
- Support the operations of the Manly Warringah Sea Eagles and ensure its viability into the future.

The proposed works will involve the construction of new training and grandstand facilities, which will involve impacts to the ground surface.

## **1.3. STATUTORY BACKGROUND**

#### 1.3.1. The National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974 (NPW Act)

The National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974 (NSW) (the NPW Act) is the primary piece of legislation for the protection of Aboriginal cultural heritage in New South Wales (NSW). The Climate Change & Sustainability Division of the Department of Planning, Industry & the Environment (DPIE) (formerly the Office of Environment and Heritage) administers the NPW Act. The NPW Act provides statutory protection for Aboriginal objects by making it illegal to harm Aboriginal objects and Aboriginal places, and by providing two tiers of offence against which individuals or corporations who harm Aboriginal objects or Aboriginal places can be prosecuted. The NPW Act defines Aboriginal objects and Aboriginal places:

Aboriginal object means any deposit, object or material evidence (not being a handicraft made for sale) relating to the Aboriginal habitation of the area that comprises New South Wales, being habitation before or concurrent with (or both) the occupation of that area by persons of non-Aboriginal extraction, and includes Aboriginal remains.

Aboriginal place means any place declared to be an Aboriginal place under section 84. The highest tier offences are reserved for knowledgeable harm of Aboriginal objects or knowledgeable desecration of Aboriginal places. Second tier offences are strict liability offences - that is, offences regardless of whether or not the offender knows they are harming an Aboriginal object or desecrating an Aboriginal place - against which defences may be established under the *National Parks and Wildlife Regulation 2009* (NSW) (the NPW Regulation).

Section 87 (1), (2) and (4) of the NPW Act establishes defences against prosecution under s.86. The defences are as follows:

- An AHIP authorised the harm (s.87(1))
- Due diligence was exercised to establish Aboriginal objects will not be harmed (s.87(2))

Due diligence may be achieved by compliance with requirements set out in the NPW Regulation or a code of practice adopted or prescribed by the NPW Regulation (s.87(3))

This DDA follows the Due Diligence Code and aims to establish whether Aboriginal objects would be harmed by the proposed redevelopment of the Study Area under s.87(2) of the NPW Act.

## 1.4. AUTHORSHIP

This DDA was prepared by Meggan Walker (Consultant Archaeologist) and Andrew Crisp (Senior Consultant, Archaeologist) and reviewed by Balazs Hansel (Associate Director, Archaeologist).

## 1.5. LIMITATIONS

This DDA has been limited in part by the high levels of disturbance within the subject area, resulting from historic land use, which reduced the ground surface visibility to nil except in areas of exposure.

# 2. THE DUE DILIGENCE PROCESS

## 2.1. OVERVIEW

The NPW Act provides statutory protection for Aboriginal objects and places in NSW.

Section 87 (2) of Part 6 of the NPW Act provides that a person who exercises 'due diligence' in determining that their actions will not harm Aboriginal objects has a defence against prosecution for the strict liability offence, outlined by Section 86 of Part 6 of the NPW Act, if they later unknowingly harm an object without an Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit (AHIP).

The Due Diligence Code (DECCW, 2010) was developed to help individuals and/or organisations to establish whether certain activities have the potential to harm Aboriginal objects within a given proposed activity footprint. Following the generic due diligence process (Figure 3), which is adopted by the NPW Regulation would be regarded as 'due diligence' and consequently would provide a defence under the NPW Act.

The due diligence process outlines a set of practicable steps for individuals and organisations in order to:

- 1. Identify whether or not Aboriginal objects are, or likely to be present in an area.
- 2. Determine whether or not their activities are likely to harm Aboriginal objects (if present).
- 3. Determine whether an AHIP application is required to carry out the harm.

This assessment follows through the steps of the due diligence process and provides clear and concise answers, and where necessary detailed description to every aspect of the due diligence code to ensure the compliance of the proposed development and assessment of any Aboriginal heritage constraints.

# 2.2. IS THE ACTIVITY A LOW IMPACT ACTIVITY FOR WHICH THERE IS A DEFENCE IN THE REGULATIONS?

No.

The proposed activity is not listed amongst the activities that provide defence under Clause 80B, Part 8A of the NPW Regulation. The proposed activity will include the demolition of existing structures, the construction of the new facilities and as such it is not defined as low-impact activity under the NPW Regulation.

### 2.3. STEP 1 – WILL THE ACTIVITY DISTURB THE GROUND SURFACE?

Yes.

The proposed activity will disturb the ground surface through the demolition of old structures and the construction of new grandstand and training facilities.

## 2.4. STEP 2A – ARE THERE ANY RELEVANT CONFIRMED SITE RECORDS OR OTHER ASSOCIATED LANDSCAPE FEATURE INFORMATION ON AHIMS?

No.

The search of the Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) was carried out on the 1<sup>st</sup> August 2019 (AHIMS Client Service ID: 438896) for an area of 3 kilometre (km) by 3 km.

Altogether 88 Aboriginal sites were identified by the AHIMS search. Two of these were subsequently identified as duplicates, bringing the total number included in the below analysis to 86.

The search found no registered Aboriginal objects and/or places within or in close proximity to the subject area. (Figure 4 and Figure 5). The closest registered Aboriginal objects and/or places are ASHIMS ID#45-6-2975 (approx. 470m west) and AHIMS ID#45-6-0700 (approx. 600m west). AHIMS ID#45-6-2975 is a rock shelter with art. AHIMS ID#45-6-0700 is a rock engraving.

Summary of the AHIMS extensive search result is provided in Table 1 below and the original extensive search results can be seen in Appendix 1.

Open sites comprised 71% (n=61) of search results, with closed sites comprising 29% (n=25). Sites which occur on sandstone – including grinding grooves, engravings and shelters – comprised 98% (n=84) of the results, which reflects the abundance of 'Hawkesbury Sandstone in the region, specifically in proximity to the coastline. Stone artefacts comprised 7% (n=6), with the dominant materials types including silcrete and mudstone. The low frequency of stone artefacts in the search results is presumably related to the high level of disturbance within the region which pre-dates the AHIMS register.

The search results suggest that Aboriginal objects and/or places are most likely to occur upon sandstone, in the form of engravings, grinding grooves and shelters. Given the absence of sandstone outcrops within the subject area, these site types are unlikely to occur.

It should be noted that the AHIMS register does not represent a comprehensive list of all Aboriginal objects or sites in a specified area as it lists recorded sites only identified during previous archaeological survey effort. The bias can be various as some areas have been the subject to more intensive archaeological investigation while some parts of the landscape have not even been surveyed to any degrees and consequently the results in the AHIMS can be patchy and incomplete. Most of the registered sites have been

identified through targeted, pre-development surveys with the restrictions on extent and scope of those developments.

Previous archaeological investigations also provide invaluable information on the spatial distribution, nature and extent of archaeological resources in a given area. There have been numerous archaeological investigations carried out in the Northern Beaches during the last 30 years. A few of these reports have been sourced from the AHIMS register. A summary of findings of these reports that are relevant to the subject area is provided in Table 2 below.

The conclusions from the summary of the AHIMS results and previous reports are the following:

- No Aboriginal objects and/or places are located within or in close proximity to the subject area.
- Archaeological sites can be anticipated to occur in close proximity to waterways.
- Areas of high disturbance can be anticipated to have low archaeological potential.
- Archaeological sites occur in the highest frequency upon sandstone outcrops in the region, and so the presence of sandstone may indicate higher archaeological potential.
- The spatial distribution of sites is closely related to the sandstone geology of the area.

The subject area is considered unlikely to contain any Aboriginal objects and or/sites given the distance from waterways, high level of disturbance and absence of sandstone outcrops.

## 2.5. STEP 2B – ARE THERE ANY OTHER SOURCES OF INFORMATION OF WHICH A PERSON IS ALREADY AWARE?

#### 2.5.1. Statutory and non-statutory heritage registers

#### 2.5.1.1. The Warringah Local Environment Plan 2011

The Warringah Local Environment Plan (LEP) 2011 Schedule 5 provides information on items of local heritage significance and outlines consent requirements for undertaking activities within identified areas of significance.

A search of the Warringah LEP 2011 Schedule 5 was undertaken on 1<sup>st</sup> August 2019. This search identified one item within the subject area. This is the Brush Box and Camphor Laurel Trees surrounding the park (I132), which were planted on Arbour Day in 1919.

#### 2.5.1.2. Warringah Development Control Plan (DCP) 2000

A review of the Warringah Development Control Plan (DCP) 2000 was completed on 1<sup>st</sup> August 2019. No controls relating to Aboriginal heritage were identified.

#### 2.5.1.3. NSW State Heritage Register (SHR)

The State Heritage Register (SHR) lists items that have been assessed as being of State heritage significance to New South Wales. Items appearing on the SHR are granted protection under s.60 of the *Heritage Act 1977* (Heritage Act).

A search of the SHR was completed on 1<sup>st</sup> August 2019. No items were identified within or adjacent to the subject area.

#### 2.5.1.4. State Government Agency Conservation (s.170) Registers

Section 170 of the Heritage Act requires that State Government Agencies establish and maintain a Heritage Conservation Register for heritage items located on land under their control or ownership. Items listed on the s.170 Register are listed on the State Heritage Inventory (SHI) and bound by the regulations of the Heritage Act.

A search of the SHI was completed on 1<sup>st</sup> August 2019. No items were identified within or adjacent to the subject area.

#### 2.5.1.5. Australian Heritage Database

The Australian Heritage Database contains information about more than 20,000 natural, historic and Indigenous places including: places in the World Heritage List, Places in the National Heritage List, places in the Commonwealth Heritage list; and places in the Register of the National Estate (RNE) (non-statutory). The list also includes places under consideration, or that may have been considered for any one of these lists.

A search of the Australian Heritage Database was carried out on 1<sup>st</sup> August 2019. No items were identified within or adjacent to the subject area.

#### 2.5.2. Soil landscape and hydrology

The subject area sits within the Sydney Basin bioregion. There are two soil landscapes identified within the subject area. These are Disturbed Terrain and the Hawkesbury soil landscapes.

Disturbed Terrain occurs across the metropolitan Sydney region and the landscape is described as previously being swamps estuaries and wetlands and cut and fill areas. The geology of this soil landscape is descried as being artificial fill, including dredged estuarine sand and mud, demolition rubble and industrial/household waste, with small amounts of rocks and local soil materials. This soil landscape is characterised by human disturbance, with complete clearance of natural vegetation and removal of natural soils. Soils are described as turfed fill areas commonly capped with up to 40 cm of sandy loam or up to 60cm of compacted clay over fill or waste materials, with predominant soil materials including loose black sandy loam, compacted mottled clay, variable transported fill and dark dredged muds and sands. This soil landscape has low archaeological potential given the extent of disturbance and the removal of natural soils

profiles which may contain artefactual deposits. The Disturbed Terrain Soil Landscape extends across the majority of the subject area.

The Hawkesbury Soil Landscape is a colluvial soil landscape which is typified by rugged, rolling to steep hills on Hawkesbury Sandstone. Soils are described as shallow (<50cm), discontinuous lithosols/siliceous sands associated with rock outcrop; earthy sands, yellow earths and some locally deep sands on inside of benches and along joints and fractures; localised yellow and red podzolic soils associated with shale lenses; and siliceous sands and secondary yellow earths along drainage lines. Dominant soil materials include loose, coarse quartz sand; earthy, yellowish brown sandy clay loam; pale strongly pedal light clay; surface litter and white loose sands. This soil landscape exists only in the northernmost part of the subject area, in Brookvale Northern Park, presumably due to the higher level of disturbance in the southern sports ground. However, disturbance in Brookvale Northern Park is also high. This is due to the landscaping and installation of a carpark, playground and structures as well as the amphitheatre seating which is set down below the natural soil profile. It is unlikely that soils even in this portion of the subject area will remain intact (see Figure 6).

The subject area is not in close proximity to any watercourses. The landscape has been subject to high levels of modification since European colonisation, with streams that once were present being filled and removed for developments to occur in their place. Greendale Creek is approximately 242 m to the south east of the subject area, and while once a more permanent creek, it is now little more than a drainage line extending through industrial and residential properties. Brookvale Creek is approximately 784 m to the south west of the subject area and remains mostly unmodified.

The spatial and stratigraphical integrity of natural soils is relevant to the potential for archaeological materials to be present. Within the subject area, disturbance levels are high. Historic aerial images show that, since the early 1940s, the subject area has been used as a sporting oval, which will have involved the levelling of soils and importation of fill for the growth of grass (see Figure 6). The resulting effect is that there is unlikely to be any intact remnant natural soils within the subject area, and thus the archaeological potential of the subject area is determined to be low.

# 2.6. STEP 2C – ARE THERE ANY LANDSCAPE FEATURES THAT ARE LIKELY TO INDICATE THE PRESENCE OF ABORIGINAL OBJECTS?

#### No.

The Due Diligence Code identifies certain landscape features that have the high potential for Aboriginal archaeological resources and cultural heritage. The following landscape features are identified as having high potential for Aboriginal objects:

- within 200 m of waters including freshwater and the high tide mark of shorelines; or
- located within a sand dune system; or
- located on a ridge top, ridge line or headland; or
- located within 200 m below or above a cliff face; or
- within 20 m of or in a cave, rock shelter, or a cave mouth.

None of these features are present within the subject area.

The original soil profile of the subject area did include sands, but high levels of disturbance have removed the natural soil profile. The low archaeological potential of the subject area is indicative of the existence of the disturbed terrain across the majority.

One way of assessing the level of surface soil disturbance is to analyse historical aerial photographs which can provide vital information on the changing environment within a given area. Aerials from 1930, 1943, 1961 and 2019 have been analysed (Figure 7). The results of the assessment are provided in Table 3

Table 3 – Results of the analysis of historic aerial images

Year	Observation
1930	In 1930, the subject area is already disturbed. Vegetation clearance had already occurred. A sports field is already in place by this date which would have required the removal of soils and levelling of the area. There are also already some structures to the west of the subject area. The northern portion of the subject area is less disturbed at this point; however, it had been cleared of vegetation previously. The north west corner of the subject area shows a residential structure and outbuildings. The listed heritage trees have, at this point, been planted.
1943	By 1943 the sports field appears more formalised, with a fence and perimeter track evident. The field also appears to be turfed, which would have required the importation of more fertile fill. At this stage the listed perimeter trees are established, and additional structures present in the west and north of the subject area.
1961	By 1961 the residential dwelling and outbuildings in the north west corner of the subject area have been demolished. A small structure with yard is present in the north eastern corner of the project area. The complex of structures along the western boundary of the subject area has increased in number by this date. Of particular interest the beginnings of a raised amphitheatre style viewing structure/bounding is present by this date with seating surrounding the oval field.
2019	By 2019, the subject area has been heavily disturbed. The shape of the field has changed from oval to rectilinear, with formalised seating around the edges and grandstand replacing the numerous earlier structures in the western subject area. The mounding on the edges of the sporting field are much more pronounced than those present in 1961 and would have resulted in heavy impacts to the ground with the

	excavating of soils and importation of fill. In the very northern portion of the subject area, the previously mostly vacant land has by this point been turned into a landscaped area with amphitheatre seating, involving the excavation of soils. There is also a car park present in the southern end of the subject area.

The available historic aerial images show that the subject area has been used as a sporting facility for the past almost 90 years, with historic records showing it was used as a sports field as early as 1912. Disturbance across the entirety of the subject area is extensive involving the removal, importation and machine movement of soils. There has also been a number of structures in the north and west of the subject area which have since been demolished to make way for modern ticket office facilities and the current grandstand respectively.

The subject area is highly disturbed as a result of its historic and current use as a sporting facility.

## 2.7. STEP 3 - CAN HARM TO ABORIGINAL OBJECTS LISTED ON AHIMS OR IDENTIFIED BY OTHER SOURCES OF INFORMATION AND/OR CAN THE CARRYING OUT OF THE ACTIVITY AT THE RELEVANT LANDSCAPE FEATURES BE AVOIDED?

There are no registered Aboriginal objects and/or places within the subject area. There are no landscape features present which would indicate archaeological sensitivity.

Disturbance across the subject area is high, which along with the absence of relevant landscape features has reduced the archaeological potential of the subject area to low. Therefore, there is low-nil potential of Aboriginal objects and/or places being harmed by the proposed works, despite impacts to the ground surface.

## 2.8. STEP 4 – DOES THE DESKTOP ASSESSMENT AND VISUAL INSPECTION CONFIRM THAT THERE ARE ABORIGINAL OBJECTS OR THAT THEY ARE LIKELY?

The desktop assessment confirmed the following:

- There are no Aboriginal objects and/or places registered within the subject area;
- There are no landscape features located within the subject area that have potential for Aboriginal objects in accordance with the Due Diligence Code;
- Disturbance relating to historical use of the subject area is high; and
- The archaeological potential of the subject area is low.

A site inspection was undertaken on Monday 5 August 2019 by Urbis Senior Archaeologist Andrew Crisp accompanied by Urbis Associate Director Lynette Gurr and Urbis Consultant Lucy King who were engaged to conduct a built heritage assessment for the same project.

Pedestrian survey was conducted of the entire subject area with particular focus given to any potential exposures. The entire subject area has been moderately to highly impacted from the construction of the current iteration of Brookvale Oval and its associated infrastructure.

To the east of Brookvale Oval impacts from the construction of artificial mounding to form an amphitheatre style viewing hills have considerably impacted on the subject area (Figure 8, Figure 10 and Figure 11). Large erosion scours along the eastern face of these mounds revealed a mixed context of medium brown sandy soil with inclusions of clay, crushed sandstone and fragments of brick throughout (Figure 9). Associated with this mounding are pathways, toilet blocks and floodlights (Figure 8).

To the rear (north) of Brookvale Oval is a small park with skirting terraced slopes, forming a small amphitheatre environment (Figure 12). Associated with this small park are a number of pagodas, two small playgrounds and a childcare centre. To the south of Brookvale Oval the terrain has been completely modified by mounding for the southern grandstand, cycle/pathways and landscaping (Figure 13).

No previously unregistered Aboriginal objects, sites nor areas of archaeological potential were identified during the survey.

# 3. CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

This DDA was prepared to investigate whether the proposed development will have the potential to harm Aboriginal objects that may exist within the subject area and inform the proposed development of any Aboriginal archaeological constrains. The DDA was prepared in accordance to the Due Diligence Code of Practice and included the following:

- Comprehensive background research of the AHIMS register, statutory and non-statutory heritage listings;
- Analysis of landscape features and their potential to retain archaeological deposits (PADs);
- Analysis of historical land use and its impact on the subject area; and
- Site inspection.

The DDA concluded that:

- There are no registered Aboriginal object and/or places and archaeological sites located within the subject area;
- The subject area is highly disturbed; and
- Due to the level of past soil disturbance and low sensitivity for Aboriginal objects to exist it is considered unlikely that the proposed works will harm Aboriginal cultural heritage and therefore no further assessment for Aboriginal heritage is recommended.

Based on the above conclusions the proposed development can proceed with caution in line with the following recommendations:

- 1. This DDA should be kept on file to as proof that the Due Diligence Process has been followed for the proposed development;
- 2. No further archaeological works relating to Aboriginal objects and/or places and archaeological sites are necessary;
- 3. Aboriginal objects are protected under the NPW Act regardless of whether they are registered on AHIMS or not. If suspected Aboriginal objects, such as stone artefacts are located during future works, works must cease in the affected area and an archaeologist called in to assess the finds. If the finds are found to be Aboriginal objects, the OEH must be notified under section 89A of the NPW Act. Appropriate management and avoidance or approval under a section 90 AHIP should then be sought if Aboriginal objects are to be moved or harmed.
- 4. In the unlikely event that suspected human remains are encountered during the demolition of the existing building, all work in the area that may cause further impact, must cease immediately and the following measures must be implemented:
  - The location, including a 20 m curtilage, should be secured using barrier fencing to avoid further harm;
  - The NSW Police must be contacted immediately;
  - Notify OEH's Environment Line on 131 555 as soon as practicable and provide available details of the remains and their location;
  - No further action is to be undertaken until the NSW Police provide written clearance for the identified remains;
  - Should the remains be identified as Aboriginal, the appropriate Local Aboriginal Land Council must be notified; and
  - A suitably qualified archaeologist and/or anthropologist with forensic training must be contacted.
