This application seeks consent development on land, or within 40m of land, containing:

- All Development Applications on
- Actual or potential threatened species, populations, ecological communities, or their habitats;
- Wildlife corridors;
- Vegetation query stipulating that a Flora and Fauna Assessment is required;
- Vegetation query X type located in both A & C Wards;

And as such, Council's Natural Environment Unit officers are required to consider the likely potential environmental impacts.

Biodiversity Referral 19 December 2024

The amended plans have been reviewed; biodiversity referral comments remain as below.

Biodiversity Referral 29 November 2024

The application has been assessed by Biodiversity referrals body for potential impacts to the endangered population of Little Penguins at Manly, as declared under the NSW Biodiversity Conservation Act 2016. The proposed retractable balustrades will serve to reduce litter ingress into penguin foraging and breeding habitat by enclosing public areas of the wharf and walkway. It is understood that potential impacts to seagrass in the adjoining waters will be assessed by the appropriate referrals body.

The proposal is therefore supported.

Wildlife Protection
