<b>HERITAGE COMMENTS</b>
<b>Discussion of reason for referral</b>
<p>The proposal has been referred to heritage as the subject site sits within C2 - Manly Town Centre Conservation Area and is within the vicinity of a number of heritage items:</p> <p><b>Item I106 - Group of commercial buildings</b> - All numbers, The Corso, Manly</p> <p><b>Item I110 - New Brighton Hotel</b> - 69–71 The Corso, Manly</p> <p><b>Item I232 - Commercial and residential building (street facade only)</b> - 4–10 Sydney Road, Manly</p> <p><b>Item I233 - Commercial and residential building</b> - 12 Sydney Road, Manly</p>
<b>Details of heritage items affected</b>
<p><b>C2 - Manly Town Centre Conservation Area</b>  <u>Statement of significance</u>  The Manly Town Centre Conservation Area (TCCA) is of local heritage significance as a reflection of the early development of Manly as a peripheral harbor and beachside village in the fledgling colony of New South Wales. This significance is enhanced by its role as a day-trip and holiday destination during those early years, continuing up to the present time, and its association with H G Smith, the original designer and developer of the TCCA as it is today.</p> <p><b>Item I106 - Group of commercial buildings</b>  <u>Statement of significance</u>  The streetscape and its special qualities are of major significance to the state. The Corso has important historical links to the development of tourism and recreation which is still present and likely to continue. It's role as the pedestrian link between harbour and ocean, city and sea - for the tourist, is fundamental to Manly's status as a resort.</p> <p><u>Physical description</u>  The Corso acts as a low scale horizontal corridor which steps down from the harbour to the ocean. The atmosphere of The Corso is of a 19th century place. Its special qualities include the contrasts of horizontal (low scale architecture) and vertical (planting) dimensions, and urban and natural elements.</p> <p><b>Item I233 - Commercial and residential building</b>  <u>Statement of significance</u>  The building, of local significance, reflects its former use as a Fire Station. It has a strong presence in</p>

the Sydney Road streetscape and contributes to the overall cultural heritage significance and character of the Town Centre Conservation Area.
